

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



Train strikes, kills pedestrian in Menlo Park

person was struck and killed by a train near the Encinal Avenue crossing in Menlo Park on Sunday evening, Aug. 11. A spokesperson from the Menlo Park Fire Protection District confirmed that the individual was pronounced dead on the scene.

The person was struck by

a southbound train near the Encinal Avenue crossing around 9 p.m. The Encinal Avenue crossing was closed for several hours on Sunday evening, but was back open by the morning of Monday, Aug. 12.

The person who was killed was identified by the San Mateo County Coroner's Office as Dylan Scirpo, 17, from Menlo Park. At 10 p.m., Caltrain sent another train to accommodate the stranded passengers, according to an X post from @ CaltrainAlerts.

The train that hit the individual was one of Caltrain's new electric trains. Sunday was the first day that these trains were operating on regular service routes, according to a press release from Caltrain. Any person who is feeling depressed, troubled or suicidal can call 1-800-784-2433 to speak with a crisis counselor. People in Santa Clara County can call 1-855-278-4204. Spanish speakers can call 1-888-628-9454.

Can Al and video stop train fatals?

- Mueller suggests a high-tech solution

San Mateo County Supervisor Ray Mueller of Menlo Park wants to see if artificial intelligence, computer technology and cameras could be used to stop suicides on the Caltrain tracks.

On Aug. 11, "a promising young 17-year-old, Dylan Scirpo, lost his life in an apparent suicide on the Caltrain tracks in Menlo Park," Mueller, a member of the Caltrain board, wrote in a memo to the railroad's management.

"I bring forward this proposal in his memory, and the memory of all those [See CALTRAIN, page 18]

who tragically lost their lives before him in similar fashion, and in recognition of the trauma their families and Caltrain employees experienced as result of

their deaths," Mueller wrote. Mueller wants Caltrain to ask for proposals for systems from AI labs at Stanford, Berkeley and San Jose State, along with other potential vendors.

In 2015, Palo Alto replaced security guards at crossings with thermal infrared cameras to spot people on the tracks.

Mueller, in his memo, said he's hoping the system would identify people "located in dangerous proximity to or on Caltrain tracks."

He also hopes the system would identify "persons exhibiting behavior consistent with the intention to inflict self-harm."

Mueller sent his memo to Caltrain chief Michelle Bouchard. Presumably it would be put on the agenda of a future Caltrain meeting for discussion. If the board agrees with the idea, Caltrain employees would write up a "request for proposals" from those who might be able to provide such a system. Then Caltrain would consider the different proposals.

After teen's apparent suicide this month, proposal surfaces to invest in Al, computer vision technology **By Alyse DiNapoli** DAILY JOURNAL STAFF

The apparent suicide of a teen is pushing some of Caltrain's leadership to advocate for heightened, investment in technologies that could lessen the number of fatal collisions. Ray Mueller, Caltrain board member and San Mateo County supervisor, urged agency staff to start looking into partnerships

with research universities and technology firms that could provide computer vision and artificial intelligence solutions that prevent such fatalities.

"Computer vision is already being used in so many different areas from a security standpoint, but I think that it's time that we look at using the application for a different purpose," Mueller said.

In a memo to Caltrain's executive director, he proposed the agency conduct a request for information to solicit bids for technology that

could identify people located "in dangerous proximity or on Caltrain tracks" and identify those "exhibiting behavior consistent with the intention to inflict self-harm," among others.

On Sunday, Aug. 11, a Menlo-Atherton High School student was struck and killed by the train in Menlo Park. Mueller said he has spoken with the family, who is supportive of the proposed discussion and request for information.

The number of Caltrain fatalities has seen slight increases over the last several years, and the majority of them are the result of suicide. There were 10 Caltrain-related deaths in 2020, increasing to 15 in 2023. This year has already seen about 13 fatalities.

Caltrain spokesperson Dan Lieberman

THE DAILY JOURNAL

said there are several initiatives the agency conducts to mitigate such collisions, such as implementing crisis hotline signs, or largescale projects, such as grade separations, which limit access to the tracks. The latter is one of the most effective solutions, though expensive and time intensive, he said.

Mueller said he knows preventing such death requires a multipronged approach, but the agency should be using all the resources at its disposal.

"I can't describe as a board member and for the Caltrain family, how impactful each one of these losses is. You feel for the family, and you want to help them, and you want to figure out a way to make it safer for them and for employees, including the trauma that they experience in this as well," Mueller said. "I don't think it's a one-size-fits-all solution ... but bringing the appropriate technology solution to the table to help aid that effort is something that I think we have to constantly be looking at given where we are."

Mueller said he is not familiar with any rail, agencies in the state using computer vision and AI technology for this type of use case but knows it has been piloted in countries such as Japan and Germany.



Dear Mr. Price,

Thank you for your recent letter addressed to the Caltrain Board of Directors. I appreciate you taking the time to share your concerns and feedback.

Historically, most fatalities on the Caltrain corridor have been determined to be intentional by coroners' offices in San Francisco, San Mateo and Santa Clara counties. The determination does not occur immediately and Caltrain is never in a position to determine whether a death on our tracks is intentional or not.

After consulting suicide prevention organizations, the Santa Clara County Behavioral Health Department, local transportation agencies such as the Golden Gate Transit District, Volpe National Transportation Systems Center, nationally renowned researchers on the topic, and rail safety staff, Caltrain no longer believes that proactively sharing fatality information to the media is the best practice.

Context

Until several months ago, it was Caltrain's practice to proactively inform media outlets of a fatality on our tracks immediately after an incident. Even when we were careful with our description, media outlets would often publish stories with headlines such as "Caltrain Kills" and sometimes include photos of the train, which suicide prevention organizations have identified as harmful. Headlines such as these are not only triggering for individuals with ideation of suicide but also for family members of those that have passed and individuals such as the train engineers and passengers who are eyewitnesses.

The well-documented phenomenon known as the Werther Effect shows that media coverage of suicides often results in copycat incidents. Although there may be a counter argument to this, the documented connection between media coverage and repeat occurrences is why most news publications have policies against covering suicides.

The World Health Organization recently published a document – Preventing Suicide: A Resource for Media Professionals.

Caltrain's New Practice

Whenever there is an incident, Caltrain intends to continue to provide the public and riders with information about service disruptions such as how long to expect delays or whether a bus bridge has been established. That information is provided through a variety of channels on social media and through Caltrain's new <u>service alerts tool</u>.

With Caltrain's new practice, we will respond to press inquiries regarding fatal incidents once the investigation has concluded and authorities have determined whether the incident was intentional or accidental. Since implementing our new practice, Caltrain preliminary data shows fewer fatalities but we will continue to monitor the trend and work with suicide prevention experts to help interpret the results over time for us.

It is our hope that Caltrain's new practice may help save lives and will not impact our commitment to providing the public and riders with information about service disruptions.

We are committed to responsive and responsible public communications and will continue to improve our practice into the future. We are willing to meet with you if you would like to continue this conversation.
